- Research: quantitative and qualitative research designs and their application to music therapy practice, supervision, administration, higher education)
- Musical Development and Personal Growth: leadership skills, selfawareness, music skills, improvisation skills in various musical styles, music technology
- Clinical Administration: laws and regulations governing the provision of education and health services, the roles of a clinical administrator in institutions and clinical settings

OR

Doctoral degree imparts advanced competence in research, theory development, clinical practice, supervision, college teaching, and/or clinical administration in three years of full-time clinical experience or equivalent
